


Issues: Supporting Notre Dame, its President, and Catholic Educational Excellence



Notre Dame and its President F. John Jenkins have come under attack recently for inviting President Barack Obama to speak at Notre Dame's Commencement ceremony on May 17th. These attacks were initiated in March by conservative Catholic groups and political commentators and are now being supported by some Catholic bishops.

<u>Catholic Democrats</u> believes that these attacks are a continuation of the divisive, and sometimes hateful, rhetoric of the Right that was witnessed during the presidential campaign. Today, these attacks are being directed at one of the nation's most venerable Catholic institutions, its president, and in a larger sense the legacy of Catholic educational excellence. At issue here is the central question of what constitutes Catholic identity.

The Catholic Democrats supports Fr. John Jenkins and the University of Notre Dame in their decision to invite President Barack Obama to deliver the university's 2009 Commencement address. We further support all Catholic educational institutions as they thoughtfully

engage students – and indeed all Catholics – to think critically about matters of faith and public policy and to bring both faith and reason to bear on the moral issues of our time.

We encourage Catholics to join us by signing our <u>statement of support</u> and asking for the support of their family, friends and personal networks by forwarding it to as many people as possible.

We believe that this issue is important not only because of the substance of this controversy but also because of the nature and tone of the debate which is fostering hatred and exacting an undisclosed cost on our Church and our country. Fr. John F. Kavanaugh, S.J., of St. Louis University may have said it best when he wrote about this controversy in a recent article in <u>America Magazine</u>: "We Catholics are in danger of becoming known not by how we love but by how we hate."
